

India rejects Pakistan actions on Gilgit-Baltistan

India on Friday termed "completely unacceptable" actions by Pakistan in regard to Gilgit-Baltistan and asserted it can neither camouflage Islamabad's illegal occupation of part of the State of Jammu and Kashmir nor hide the denial of basic rights to the people in that part for the past six decades. "The entire State of Jammu and Kashmir is an integral part of India by virtue of its accession to India in 1947. Any action to alter the status of any part of the territory under the illegal occupation of Pakistan has no legal basis whatsoever, and is completely unacceptable," Vishnu Prakash, official spokesperson of the Ministry of External Affairs said here in a statement.

Made on behalf of a working group set up by the Prime Minister in 2006 to consider measures for strengthening the relationship between the Union of India and Jammu and Kashmir, Justice Ahmed's recommendations are less-than-substantial. Among other things, he has called on the Prime Minister to set up a mechanism to restore J&K's autonomy "to the extent possible."

Azad Kashmir, which had till recently remained relatively free from terror attacks, seems to have been increasingly drawn into the spiral of violence that has shaken Pakistan. Most recently, two security personnel were killed and three others injured in an attack on their vehicle near Rawalakot. The area till now had a reputation for immaculate law and order, with people safely leaving doors unlocked even in this day and age. There had previously been other deaths in a bombing targeting an Ashura procession in Muzaffarabad. The patterns of violence thus seen across Pakistan have quite obviously spread to Azad Kashmir. The heavy troop presence in the area of course makes it a tempting target for militants. It is indeed ironic that the issue of militancy, which began with the 'jihad' in Kashmir and the emergence of groups backed by the establishment, should have returned to us in a somewhat different form, with 'jihadi' militants seen as allies in the past having turned into foes.
